

HEDBA APPENDIX 1: SCHEDULED MONUMENTS

1. As noted within the Historic Environment Desk Based Assessment, a total of 80 scheduled monuments were identified within 10 km of the proposed wind turbines. The first process to assess potential impacts from the proposed wind farm on the significance of these monuments was to ascertain which of those were intervisible with the wind turbines.
2. The Zone of Theoretical Visibility (ZTV) based on the 149.9m blade heights of the turbines has been used to determine this intervisibility.
3. Where there is no intervisibility with the turbine blades, those scheduled monuments have been removed from the assessment process. The theoretical number of turbines visible from each scheduled monument within the study area has also been identified in the following categories (Figure 6):

Category A: 12 to 13 turbines visible

Category B: 8 to 11 turbines visible

Category C: 5 to 7 turbines visible

Category D: 1 to 4 turbines visible

4. HEDBA Appendix 1: Scheduled Monuments Stage 1 identifies the 80 scheduled monuments within the 10km area, and indicates which of the monuments lie within the ZTV categories identified above. Those not in ZTV categories were removed from further assessment. Those with 4 or below turbines visible, where they lie over 5km from the proposed wind farm were also removed as there would be no change to the significance of these monuments from the proposals.
5. Following this, a Stage 2 assessment was undertaken. This looked at the scheduling description and monument type, as well as the distance of the monument to the wind turbines to see where intervisibility may still indicate potential harm to the significance of the monuments from the proposals. This determined that the majority of scheduled monuments would have no impacts to their significance from the construction of the wind turbines, although all of those within the Blaenavon World Heritage Site (WHS) to the north-east required further assessment.
6. Stage 3 looks again at the monuments identified from Stage 2 where impacts to significance may occur and further assessment of this impact was determined and whether assessment within the report and Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) would be required. In this instance, no further assessment was identified for any of the scheduled monuments.
7. A similar process was undertaken for listed buildings within HEDBA Appendix 2: Listed Buildings.

GM597	Abersychan Railway	Post Medieval/Modern	<p>The Abersychan Limestone Railway was constructed c. 1826. The railway was very unusual for a region more used to tramroads - its wrought-iron fish-belly rail was unique in South Wales. The use of the rail was apparently due to speculative ironmasters from outside the region, who had opened the British Ironworks in a side valley to the west of Abersychan. Limestone quarries were opened in Cwm Lascarn to the east of Abersychan and the Limestone Railway constructed to transport the stone. The Railway ran south from the quarry on the east side of the valley for more than 1.7km before dropping to the valley floor by means of an incline, crossing the river and continuing (partly via the Blaenavon Railway) to reach the British Ironworks. The Abersychan Limestone Railway was in use for over two decades, before the Blaenavon Railway was converted to standard gauge and a new standard gauge incline was constructed linking it to the Ironworks. Operations at the Cwm Lascarn quarries ceased.</p> <p>The majority of the Abersychan Limestone Railway on the east side of the valley survives as a revetted terrace with several embankments and a cutting, the whole falling at an average grade of 1:25. Many stretches of the railway boast complete rows of stone blocks. Investigation by John van Laun (2001, p 40-5) has revealed that the track consisted of wrought-iron fish-belly rails (rather than the more usual plate rails or cast-iron bars).</p> <p>The scheduling description notes that it is of national importance for its 'potential to enhance our knowledge of the development of industrial transportation in the nineteenth century. This rare surviving section of railway is a vivid illustration of the scale of the industrial ironworking landscape, the unusual construction technique and brief period of use representing a well-preserved single phase in the development of early limestone transportation methods'. The presence of the proposed wind turbines within the wider landscape of the monument would not physically impact on it or its potential to enhance our knowledge of the development of industrial transportation in the nineteenth century. The turbines lie at a distance where they would not affect any features which may be associated with the railway.</p> <p>The proposed wind turbines would have no detrimental impacts to the setting of the railway that would reduce its significance.</p>	327628	204223	6.32km N	Part A / part none	No
MM071	Begwns Round Barrow, Mynydd Machen	Bronze Age	<p>The monument comprises the remains of an earth and stone-built round barrow, which probably dates to the Bronze Age (c. 2300 - 800 BC). The site is situated on the summit of Mynydd Machen and has a Trig Point on top of it. It is circular in plan, 17m in diameter and 2.5m high with a flat top.</p> <p>The monument is of national importance for its potential to enhance our knowledge of prehistoric burial and ritual practices. The monument is an important relic of a prehistoric funerary and ritual landscape and retains significant archaeological potential, with a strong probability of the presence of both intact burial or ritual deposits, together with environmental and structural evidence. Barrows may be part of a larger cluster of monuments and their importance can be further enhanced by their group value.</p> <p>All thirteen turbines are theoretically visible from the barrow, although they would lie at a distance of over 8km. The proposals would not affect the intervisibility of the scheduled barrow with other cairns in the vicinity on other hilltops, or affect their interrelationship. It is therefore considered that there would be no change to the significance of the monument from the proposals and it is not considered further.</p>	322376	190010	8.22km WSW	A	No
MM079	Cae Camp	Prehistoric	<p>The monument comprises the remains of a hillfort, which probably dates to the Iron Age period (c. 800 BC - AD 74, the Roman conquest of Wales). The hillfort is situated on the ridge top between the Usk Valley and that of the Sor brook to the west. It is a small, roughly circular camp, measuring 100m in diameter, with a disused quarry occupying the centre. There is an inner scarp 2.2m high all around, except in places on the east side, where it is only 1m high. On the south side there is a 15m wide berm outside this, then a further scarp 1.7m high. 			<p>east end. Along the west side the berm is narrower, and on the south-west side is a slope rather than a flat berm. Further north it becomes a faint ditch 4m wide and 0.7m deep. The outer bank is 1.8m high on the outside along this side. The north side is similar, with the edge of the outer bank on the hedge line. The outer side is 2m high and has probably been steepened as it forms the field boundary. Along the east side there is a berm 11m wide and then an outer scarp 2.2m high. The field boundary (hedge) is at the foot of the scarp, with the road to its east. This may have obliterated an outer ditch. There is a slight dip in the edge of the berm in the south-east corner, which might mark the entrance. The interior slopes gently towards the edges. In the middle, towards the north end is an irregularly-shaped old quarry, up to 3m deep.</p> <p>The monument is of national importance for its potential to enhance our knowledge of later prehistoric defensive organisation and settlement. The site forms an important element within the wider later prehistoric context and within the surrounding landscape. The site is well preserved and retains considerable archaeological potential. There is a strong probability of the presence of evidence relating to chronology, building techniques and functional detail.</p> <p>Hillforts were typically located in prominent positions on hill tops or rises in ground level to maximise their visibility in the wider landscape. Cae Camp lies over 10km from the centre of the site and although all thirteen turbines would theoretically be visible from the hillfort, they would be at a distance that would cause no obstructions in its intervisibility with the wider landscape. They would not obscure the potential visible connection between Candwr Camp to the west and Cae Camp to the east. The proposed wind turbines would have no impact upon the significance of the monument and it is not considered further.</p>

The adjacent Civil settlement and amphitheatre are also located in this area.</p> <p>Caerleon Legionary Fortress: The fortress at Caerleon, or Isca, is one of only three permanent legionary fortresses in Britain and was founded around AD75. Its construction was probably linked to the campaigns of the Governor of Britannia, Julius Frontinus, against the Silures. The fortress was home to the 2nd Augusta Legion, a legion of over 500 men. The site of the fortress was chosen for its position on gently rising ground adjacent to the river Usk at a point where it could be bridged but was also accessible to sea-going ships, and on the road between Wroxeter, Gloucester and Carmarthen. The fortress covered an area of 50 acres and conformed to the standard playing card design, had a gated entrance in the middle of each side and was divided into insulae, or blocks, by a network of roads. The fortress was in use by the 2nd Augusta Legion until around AD300 after which it continued to be partly occupied although there is no clear evidence to determine whether the occupation was military or civilian.</p> <p>The earliest defences comprised a turf and clay bank surmounted by timber defences, timber towers forming gatehouses at each entrance, and single timber towers spaced at intervals around the fortress walls. A large V-shaped ditch, 8m wide and 2.5m deep, ran around the outside of the defences. Excavation of a section of the fortress defences in Prysog Field revealed that oak logs had been laid on the ground as a foundation for the bank. Over these foundations the bank was constructed using turves cut to regulation size, and clay dug from the external ditch. The bank had a vertical outer face and was 5.5m wide and up to 3m high. A road, the via sagularis, ran around the inside of the rampart and allowed soldiers rapid access to the defences in case of attack. At the beginning of the 2nd century AD the timber defences were rebuilt in stone. The outside face of the bank was fronted with a stone wall 1.5m thick, the gates were fortified by twin towered stone gatehouses and a series of stone turrets replaced the individual timber towers.</p> <p>The internal layout of the fortress conformed to the standard legionary fortress plan, with the via principalis running E/W through the fort, the via praetoria running N/S to intersect with it, and a network of other roads linking the different areas of the fortress. The earliest buildings are likely to have been timber-built, later replaced in stone. In the centre of the fortress, under the modern Church, was the Principia or headquarters, behind which was the Legate's residence. 		<p>of the Legate's residence were a series of workshops, one of which, a large courtyard building, has been subject to geophysical survey. The results of the survey suggest that it was used for ironworking on an industrial scale. Barrack blocks were located both along the north side of the via principalis and inside the north defences. A section of the north barrack block complex was excavated in 1927/29 by Victor Nash Williams and is still exposed. The barrack blocks would have housed a legionary century (80 men), with 10 groups of eight men sharing two rooms. The smaller of the two rooms would have been used for storage and the larger room for sleeping. The centurion's residence, which included housing for junior officers and also offices, is located at the north end of each barrack block. A latrine block is located to the north of the barrack blocks, immediately inside the defensive bank. A series of ovens and cookhouses are located on the inside of the west rampart, separated from the barracks by the line of the via sangularis.</p> <p>On the south side of the via principalis were the fortress baths. These were subject to a series of excavations between 1964 and 1981. The baths were one of the first buildings to be constructed from stone, and date to AD75/77. They were an enormous complex, and included a large open air courtyard with a swimming pool and a huge range of buildings that contained the baths and an exercise hall. The outdoor swimming pool and a section of the cold baths, frigidarium, are on display in the fortress baths museum.</p> <p>On either side of the baths complex, fronting the via principiis, were houses for Tribune's, senior army officers. In the south-west quadrant of the fortress the area behind the Tribune's houses was occupied by three granaries and a large courtyard building that was used as a warehouse. Excavations carried out on the west range of the courtyard building revealed that it had been used for the storage of military equipment, with an exceptional collection of bronze and iron armour fragments found in one room. On the east side of the baths complex a possible hospital was identified through excavation, while further barrack blocks were located inside the south defences, either side of the via preatoria.</p> <p>The monument is of national importance for its potential to enhance our knowledge of Roman military organisation. The monument forms an important element within the wider context of the Roman occupation of Wales and the structures may contain well preserved archaeological evidence concerning chronology, layout and building techniques.</p> <p>Caerleon Civil Settlement: The civil settlement, known as the Canabae, is associated with and located on the western side of the Roman fortress of Isca. The extent of the civilian settlement is known as a result of geophysical survey and small scale excavation, and covers land to the south and west of the fortress, either side of the modern Broadway. The Broadway follows the line of a road of Roman date that led from the west gate of the fortress to the quay on the River Usk and was the main focus of civilian settlement. Geophysical survey in the fields around the amphitheatre revealed a complex of large public style buildings extending over an area of about 5 hectares. Work in the 1950s had indicated the presence of large roman buildings in this area, including a bath-house and a building with a monumental entranceway. The monumental complex revealed during the geophysical survey includes one of the largest buildings known from Roman Britain, as well as several other buildings reminiscent of roman 'public' military architecture. Small-scale excavation on the site confirmed that the monumental complex was Roman in date, probably going out of use in the early-3rd century AD, and that it consisted of three distinct structures. The monumental complex has been interpreted as part of the official civilian settlement, the Canabae Legionis. Other structures associated with the Canabae have been located through geophysical survey on both sides of the Broadway, running back approximately 50m from the road. The survey also revealed several small roads running off Broadway, along which structures were identified. The structures appear to be multi-phased and constructed from both timber and stone. The site of the 3rd century AD quay was identified at the west end of Broadway and was excavated in the 1960s, it lies under the modern golf course. Further settlement structures have been identified on the north-west side of the fortress, in an area of allotments and playing fields, these are also included in the scheduling.</p> <p>The monument is of national importance for its potential to enhance our knowledge of Roman urban settlement organisation. It retains significant archaeological potential, with a strong probability of the presence of associated archaeological features and deposits.</p>

		<p>Caerleon Amphitheatre: The amphitheatre, dates to the Roman period (1st - 4th century AD). The amphitheatre was built around AD90 outside the west wall of the fortress, in an area already occupied by civilian settlement and an extra-mural bath building. The structure was excavated in 1926/27 by Mortimer Wheeler, then director of the National Museum of Wales, and was subsequently gifted to the nation.</p> <p>The amphitheatre is oval in plan, 90m long by 70m wide, and is orientated roughly NW/SE. The external walls of the amphitheatre are stone-built, with large stone buttresses. The internal walls, defining the edge of the arena, are also stone built and would originally have been covered with white plaster onto which red lines were painted to represent dressed ashlar – remains of this plaster were found during the excavation of the site. The walls would have been no higher than they are today, and would have supported a timber grandstand on which up to 6000 spectators would have sat during games and events at the amphitheatre. The space between the inner and outer walls would have been filled with banked earth that would have provided additional support for the timber seating.</p> <p>There were two main entrances, or portae pompae, that led into the area, one at the north end and one at the south end. These would have consisted of stone-built barrel-vaulted arches covering paved entrances, and would have been used by processions of performers at the start of events in the arena. There are six smaller entrances that would have been used by spectators to access the seating and by performers to enter the arena, three on the west side of the amphitheatre and three on the east. There is a strong probability of the presence of evidence relating to chronology, building techniques and functional detail.</p> <p>Hillforts were typically located in prominent positions on hill tops or rises in ground level to maximise their visibility in the wider landscape. Lodge Wood Camp lies over 9km from the centre of the proposed wind farm and although all thirteen turbines would theoretically be visible from the hillfort, they would be at a distance that would cause no obstructions in its intervisibility with the wider landscape. The proposed wind turbines would have no impact upon the significance of the monument and it is not considered further.</p>




